The purpose of the club was to take instructions in sewing, which they did under the direction of Estella Ricketts until she married and left the community.

For a time the officers served for six months, but this was later changed to each group of officers serving one year.

The first programs were gotten out in 1916 when Louise Harrington Yeagle was president. Subjects relating to the various phases of home life were discussed.

It was the custom of the club members to give a linen shower and cook book to a member who announced her approaching mar-riage and if a member moved from the community she was given a silver thimble.
